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This Week's Adventures

Nursery: This week Nursery have been busy learning the names of farm animals and their young. We found out which animals are kept on farms to produce food like meat, eggs, milk, cheese, yoghurt etc. and then we discovered that some of them can also give us products such as wool, leather and feathers. We also realised that some farm animals like sheepdogs, cats and horses are on farms because they work and help the farmer. We compared farm animals to pets and wild animals and thought about the differences between them. We also looked at the type of homes the farm animals live in.... eg. coops, fields, barns, stables, mud, sties, pens, or ponds and we had great fun pretending to be farm animals by dressing up in animal costumes and making animal noises!

Reception: In Reception, this week's topic was 'Friendship'. The children discussed what friendship means, how friends share and care about each other, how they help and work together and how, sometimes, friends fall out. They worked together and produced great pieces of work that can be admired on displays around the classrooms. The children listened to stories like 'The Rainbow Fish', 'Should I Share my Ice Cream?' and 'The Squirrels that Squabbled' and shared their ideas on how conflicts can be avoided and resolved. In Maths, the children were introduced to number 3, compared numbers using the correct mathematical language and played number games.

- Year 1: In Year 1 this week, we completed our learning about 'Beegu' by retelling the story in our own words. Our teachers were very impressed with how amazing our sentences were. In maths, we have been looking at parts and wholes understanding that a whole can be split into smaller parts. This will help us when we move onto learning about addition and subtraction next week. In science, we looked at the sense of touch and the sense of hearing. We had a special freely bag and had to guess what was inside by using our sense of touch.
- Year 2: It's been another great week in Year 2. In maths, we have been focusing on addition and subtraction, where we used our knowledge of number bonds to 10 to help us solve calculations. 'If I were in charge of the world' is the title of the poem we have been reading in English, we've started writing our own version of the poem thinking about all the things the children would want to change if they could, we've had some very funny idea like 'I'd banish sticky Brussel sprouts and mouldy cheese'. The children have been using contractions in their poems, using words like 'I'd' rather than 'I would'. In RE, we learnt about why Abraham and Moses are important within Judaism. In our Science lesson, we looked at how our diet is important for our growth and development.
- Year 3: This week Year 3 have been working very hard in Maths, adding and subtracting ones, tens and 100s. They have used number lines, 10 base and number bonds to support them to add numbers crossing 10s and 100s. In English we have started a new unit, Poetry, we are looking at a poem called 'The Reflection In Me', children have studied the key features of the poem and have started writing their own sentences inspired by this work. We have been impressed by the use of adjectives and similes in their writing. For Black History Month, we have looked at some inspiring people including Katherine Johnson and Lewis Hamilton, children discussed how these figures have made a difference and how they have impacted us all. In RE children have looked at women in Islam to build positive attitudes of respect towards other people who hold views and beliefs different from their own, some examples they have learnt about are Nadiyah Hussain, a chef and writer and Ibtihaj Muhammed, an American fencer.
- Year 4: This week, Year 4 have been focussing on Heritage Week as part of Black History Month. We have explored why BHM is celebrated and looked at the trailblazing achievements of black Britons with a particular focus on the inspirational space scientist Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock. In Maths, we have continued formal written methods for adding and subtracting 4 -digit numbers. In Science, things got messy with a practical demonstration of how the digestive process works. In RE, we looked at the origins of Hinduism. In Music, we have continued learning Mamma Mia, as well as our Harvest Festival song. We very much enjoyed our African Drumming workshop too. Owl Class have been busily preparing for their class assembly next Tuesday. Keep learning those times tables you are doing so well! Enjoy the long weekend.
- Year 5: This week, Year 5 have greatly enjoyed African drumming and researching female role models for Black History Month. Whilst in PE, we complete a whole body work out on Monday; everyone worked hard and are improving their core skills. In reading, we built on our Year 3 knowledge of Ancient Egypt (Gods and mummification)— we continue to make connections, work on vocabulary and VIPER skills. Poetry has been positively superb. The pupils have been inspired by the poem written by Maya Angelou and used powerful and emotive language in their own poems. Astly, in science we recapped life cycles and are learning our harvest song 'Harvest for the World' by The Isley Brothers.
- Year 6. Year 6 began to look at the poem 'Beautiful Ambition' by Karl Nova. We listened to the poet perform his poem and thought about our dreams and the routes we take to achieve these dreams. Then we looked at the shape and structure of the poem in preparation for writing our own version. In maths, we looked at adding and subtracting integers and learnt the language we use to describe the different parts of addition and subtraction calculations. This week we participated in a Djembe drumming session which was a lot of fun. We learnt how to play different notes and about poly-rhythms. We did research into the Windrush and created news reports about why people came to Britain and what their live was like when they arrived. We also researched Olive Morris, a political activist for black women's rights, and create non-chronological reports about her.

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
Soft Starts

We would like to say thank you to all those children who came into school earlier for Soft Starts; people reported that this made a very calm start to the day. The children in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 continue to be invited and encouraged to come into school from 8:40am on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The aim of this slightly earlier start is to enable a slow and gentle start to the school day. The children will be welcomed into their classroom by their teacher and encouraged to complete low stakes, calming activities, possibly to some gentle music. This may involve looking at a book alone or with a friend, mindful colouring, free drawing, playing a calm game etc. During this time, the teachers will be able to chat with the children, see that everyone is ok and give attention to those that may need it. We are aiming to use this time to help develop the children's emotional wellbeing. We would like as many children as possible to participate in these 'Soft Starts' so that we can explore the benefits for the children. Thank you in advance for your support.
